Last

Monday,

health insurance: starting a year from now, all private plans will be required to cover preventive services for women's health without a co-pay or deductible. Bill O'Reilly's <u>sexist objections</u> aside, this will do a lot to increase access to contraception--and thus reduce unwanted pregnancies.
